dead along with a taxi driver outside
Yangon's international airport on
Sunday, officials said. Ko Ni, a
member of Aung San Suu Kyi's
National League for Democracy
party, was gunned down as he was
waiting for a taxi outside arrivals
around 5pm (1030GMT) by an
assassin who also killed the driver.

<u>India signs MoU to make Rajshahi a</u> sustainable city in northern Bangladesh

bdnews24 | 30th January The Indian High Commission is Dhaka has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Raishahi City Corporation to help the northern Bangladesh city to become a 'sustainable one'. Under the MoU signed on Sunday in the presence of High Commissioner Harsh Vardhan Shringla, India would provide financing to the tune of nearly Tk 211 million for different construction and conservation projects. Those include reconstruction of the infrastructure of Raishahi Cultural Sangho, construction of a Library building – Padma Library, conservation of city water bodies, construction of footpaths along different roads in the city and conservation of temples in the city.

<u>Govt. Keeping Mum on Kandahar</u> Explosion Findings

Daily Outlook Afghanistan/ ToloNews|30th January Kandahar provincial council members claimed on Sunday that the government is not revealing its findings following a probe into the recent bomb blast at the Kandahar governor's guesthouse which claimed the lives of 12 people, including five United Arab Emirates diplomats. "No information has been given to people and no satisfactory evidence has been shown to them," Sayed Ahmad Silab, a member of the council, said. The incident is being investigated by a commission appointed by the Afghan government; in addition to the task team, the United Arabs Emirates (UAE) and NATO are also investigating the incident.

AFGHANISTAN

IEC Fails to Agree on Candidate for Secretariat Post

The Independent Election Commission (IEC) has failed to reach a consensus on who to appoint to lead the IEC secretariat, former IEC chief Fazel Ahmad Manavi said on Sunday. This comes two weeks after the IEC reportedly submitted the names of three candidates for the position to the National Unity Government (NUG). However, all three were reportedly rejected by President Ashraf Ghani and CEO Abdullah Abdullah. Meanwhile, election observers and monitoring groups have accused IEC officials of dealing with the appointment from a political perspective. Afghan Civil Society Election Network (ACSEN) has meanwhile accused the IEC of exploiting the election process for their own political purposes, warning that the weak performance and weak management by the IEC would plunge the next elections in a crisis.

NUG Criticized for Not Appointing Ministers in Key Portfolios

A number of MPs and analysts on Saturday raised the issue of key government positions being run by caretakers, including the Ministry of Mines and Petroleum, which according to them is critical in leading the country towards self-reliance. Critics urged the National Unity Government (NUG) to address the issue and end the caretaking trend. "At least nine ministries are run by caretakers, according to the Wolesi Jirga's [Lower House of Parliament] information. And these are among key and important ministries. These are the ministries which can affect the [overall] budget spend process," MP Fawzia Kofi said.

Afghanistan-China trade via railway face challenges

The Afghanistan Chamber of Commerce and industry (ACCI) on Sunday said that minimum production and shortage of market are the main obstacles for the export of Afghan goods to the China, local media reported. Ariana news reported that the Afghan government and its leaders have always insisted on the key role of China in resolving Afghanistan's economic challenges. To overcome the deserts and mountains, trade through railway was inaugurated between the two countries, but only two cargos were pulled in the northern Hairatan of the country. ACCI claims that the government has failed to utilize the opportunity properly. "The poor quality, lack of low productivity and lack of markets for Afghan goods in China are sole reason behind these problems," ACCI spokesman, Sayam Pesarlay said.

BANGLADESH

Bangladesh Minister says India may change 'form and design' of Tipaimukh project

India may bring changes to the 'basic form and design' of Tipaimukh hydroelectric project following Bangladesh's opposition and concerns over possible damage to the lower riparian. Water Resources Minister Anisul Islam Mahmud told Parliament on Sunday that New Delhi has recently conveyed the message to Dhaka of its willingness to reconsider the 'basic form' of the project. Answering to a question from Nizam Uddin Hazari, MP, the minister said a joint survey was being conducted to assess the effects of the project on Bangladesh.

Finance Minister Muhith satisfied with macro economic indicators

No meddling in local govt affairs

Lifting of ban on loans drives credit growth

While deposits with the financial institutions experienced a growth of 17 percent, credit expanded by 21 percent, last year. The total credit outstanding with the financial institutions, (banks and non-banking financial institutions, excluding the NPPF) saw a growth of 21.1 percent, to Nu 86.6 billion in 2016 from Nu 71.5 billion in June 2015.

PAKISTAN

Palestinian president arrives in Islamabad today

President of the State of Palestine Mahmoud Abbas is arriving here today (Monday) on a two-day official visit to hold wide-ranging talks with Pakistan's top leadership, the Foreign Office announced on Sunday. The statement said this would be President Abbas's third visit to Pakistan as he previously traveled to Islamabad in 2005 and 2013. On his current tour, he would be accompanied by a 17-member delegation including 5 ministers, the statement added.

Employees oppose proposal to lease out PSM for 30 years

The employees of Pakistan Steel Mills (PSM) have opposed a government proposal to lease out the country's largest

industrial unit for 30 years and urged that those who brought this national asset to its knees be held accountable. In a letter sent to the ministries of finance, privatisation and industries, the PSM Workers Union (CBA) also questioned a suggestion for the imposition of regulatory and anti-dumping duties or a ban on steel imports for the future private operator, wondering why such protections were never granted to the PSM while it was in public hands, despite repeated requests.

Trump administration might extend visa suspension to Pakistan

An official with the Trump administration has hinted that the recent suspension imposed on travel from seven Muslim countries might be extended to other countries, including Pakistan. White House chief of staff Reince Priebus, while talking on CBS News, clarified that this is "not a Muslim ban". "You can point to other countries that have similar problems like Pakistan and others - perhaps we need to take it further," said Priebus. "But for now, immediate steps, pulling the Band-Aid off, is to do further vetting for people traveling in and out of those countries," added the White House chief of staff.

Unesco agrees to add eight more Pakistani sites to world heritage list

The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (Unesco) has accepted a proposal to include eight more Pakistani sites of cultural and natural significance to its list of World Heritage Sites. The Derawar Fort in Cholistan, Hingol Cultural Landscape in Balochistan, Nagarparkar Cultural Landscape in Sindh, Central Karakoram National Park and Deosai National Park in Gilgit-Baltistan, Ziarat Juniper Forest and Karez System Cultural Landscape in Balochistan and the Khewra Salt Range in Punjab have been named in a tentative list prepared by the Department of Archaeology and Museums (DOAM) and accepted by Unesco as properties of universal value.

Mauritania wants to elevate relations with Sri Lanka
