"How Efficiently Can India Bridge the Gaps in its Society?": **Nobel Laureate Michael Spence**

On September 07, 2009, Nobel Laureate in Economics 2001 and Professor, Stanford Graduate School of Business, Stanford University, USA Prof.Michael Spence talked about the global economic crisis with a select group of industry members and intellectuals at a session organized by Aspen Institute India in New Delhi.

Prof. Spence referred to the crisis as having demonstrated the failure of

regulators, academics and consumers. It was a collective failure of the stakeholders in the financial system, who assumed that the systems are self-regulatory.

However, it is worrisome that as the crisis passes, the pressure on re-regulation will also decline and lose momentum. Slipping back into the existing system, with its lapses and loopholes would not be a very stable or sustainable state for the global financial architecture. The impact in India has been visible. India has become unduly cautious about its lending programs. Since the contemporary pattern of consumption is based on advance spending, it may now become a challenge to secure financial support in India for further growth of business. However, most probably the lines of credit will open up with slightly greater financial stability. Lending may become a little more expensive but will not be cut off. The anxiety about India, going forward, is

how efficiently it will able to bridge the gaps within its society. While the private sector is going great guns and the corporate keep getting richer by the day, there are 600 million people living in a sea of poverty and there is a huge disconnect there. The corporate sector needs to be more forthcoming on the domestic "inclusion" agenda, without losing out on its global competitiveness factor.

"India One of the Top Relationships for the US": Prof. Nick Burns

On August 21, 2009 Aspen Institute India organized an interactive session with Nicholas Burns, Professor, Practice of Diplomacy and International Politics, Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University and Former Under Secretary of Political Affairs, US Department of State in New Delhi. The session was moderated by Aii Vice Chairman, Mr.Gautam Thapar. Nick Burns made insightful observations about the future of India-US relations, demonstrating that India is one of the top 2 or 3 important relationships for the USA. The visit of Prime Minister Singh in November 2009 at the invitation of President Obama will be the first official State visit.

This is a dynamic time for both countries, who cannot afford to be isolationist or unilateralist in nature. Complex challenges confronting the world are climate change, terrorism, global economic recession, trafficking of women and children, and pandemics among others. India and the US share a common strategic interest, more than any other 2 countries in the world, be it pertaining to the South Asian region or the world. Both countries must work towards overcoming their historical and ideological differences to build a stronger partnership.

India and the US have differing points of view on issues such as **climate change**, **international trade** and the **nuclear issue**. However, there are many areas, which can be positive forces as strong pillars of our relationship:

- Counter Terrorism
- Defence cooperation
- Agriculture
- Green Technologies
